

Shoreland Aesthetics

Signs

- Commercial signs (public safety signs excepted) which are visible from public waters may only be located on the premises which they serve. Temporary real estate signs may be placed on properties offered for sale.

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Signs

- Commercial signs visible from the water may only be located on the premises which they serve
- Temporary real estate signs exempted

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Lighting

- Flashing or rotating lighting is prohibited
- Exterior lighting greater than 100 watts shall be shielded
- Lighting directed away from the water
- Total candlepower of exterior lighting limited to __ watts incandescent or equivalent
- Lighting provisions shall apply to all existing shoreland lighting in 2 years

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Lighting

- Flashing or rotating exterior lighting is prohibited.
- Exterior lighting (of greater than 100 watts incandescent or equivalent) shall be fitted with an opaque shield which prevents direct visibility of the lamp from public waters and from outside of the premises on which the lighting is located.
- Lighting for safety purposes on licensed dams and public roadways is exempted from the provisions of 1 & 2. Marinas may provide shielded and down focused lighting of docks and their immediate vicinity.

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Lighting continued..

- Lighting otherwise prohibited may be authorized as a conditional use if there are special circumstances relating to essential safety or security concerns and the public interest in the provisions of this section can be adequately protected.
- The provisions of 1-4 shall apply to all exterior lighting installed after (date of amendment) and to all existing lighting as of (2 years from date).

Lighting provisions apply:

- to all existing shoreland lighting after a 2 year grace period to allow compliance;
- immediately as part of the mitigation package;
- 60 days after a letter is sent to a landowner in response to a complaint.
- No maximum total wattage, lumens, or candlepower

The next steps are to:

- Hold open houses to present this package and solicit public comments
- Take public comments to the Zoning and Land Conservation Committees of the County Board
